

Felsted Pubs

Did you know that in 1899, and probably for a few years either side of that date, Felsted 'boasted' at least 10 pubs, and probably 11. Before you read on, how many can you name?

Let's start with the two that have endured – the Swan and the Chequers. Neither is the original building. The Swan was rebuilt around 1925 at a cost of £6,800, replacing a C15/C16 building. The present Chequers dates from 1901, rebuilt by Ridleys at a more modest cost of £1,790. Both of these were 'inns' offering food and accommodation but my list includes much more humble premises such as beerhouses.

Now here's an old joke – if you started at the Swan and walked round the 'three mile' how many pubs would you pass? The answer, of course, is none because you'd have a drink in each of the Yew Tree at Causeway End, the Three Horseshoes and the Labourer's Arms at Bannister Green, and the White Hart which stood right next to the Chequers where Roslyn House is now. It's not unusual to find two pubs next to each other in a town, slightly more so in a village, but the Swan also had a very near neighbour, the Bell Inn in Station Road. Both sold beer from, and were possibly owned by, Russells Gravesend brewery with their Shrimp Brand Beers. The Bell closed in 1910 but had a long history; along with the Swan and the White Hart it is mentioned in the Return of the Surveyor of Weights and Measures in 1756.

To complete our list we must visit several hamlets where we find the Crooked Billet at Gransmore Green, the Pyes Bridge Tavern near Crix Green, the Sugar Loaves at Willows Green and the Black Horse in Chelmsford Road. Although latterly several pubs were supplied by our local brewer – Ridleys – the Pyes Bridge Tavern was owned by Greene King and was, I believe, still a beerhouse when it closed in the 1960s.

Let's end with a favourite quote from the period 'Let a man walk ten miles steadily on a hot summer's day along a dusty English road and he will soon discover why beer was invented' (GK Chesterton).

Bryan Grimshaw - Felsted History Recorder

Recipe: Almond and Cherry Slices

This treat is easily adapted to gluten free by using a gluten free pastry.

Makes 14 slices Prep 15 mins Cook time 30-40 minutes

Ingredients

225g ready-to-roll pastry 75g unsalted butter 30ml cherry jam 50g ground rice 50g ground almonds 125g caster sugar 1 medium egg, beaten ½ tsp almond extract 15g flaked almonds Additional butter for greasing and flour for rolling pastry (GF if necessary)

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 160C (fan 140C), gas mark 3.
- 2. Grease a 28 x 18cm baking tray.
- 3. Lightly dust the surface of your worktop with some plain flour and roll out the pastry to a thickness of 5mm.
- 4. Place the pastry over the baking tray. Press the pastry into the base and use a knife to trim any excess from the edges.
- 5. Spread the jam over the pastry.
- 6. Melt the butter and mix with the ground rice, ground almonds, caster sugar, beaten egg, and almond extract until evenly combined.
- 7. Pour the mixture into the baking case and scatter the flaked almonds over the top.
- 8. Bake in the centre of a preheated oven for 30-40 minutes or until golden brown and springy to the touch.
- 9. Leave in the tin for 10 minutes before cutting into 14 slices

Serve warm with custard or enjoy with a cup of tea

In February work progressed fast on the second half of the new path to make sure it was ready for visitors on snowdrop days. Unfortunately, the good weather for pathbuilding also meant the snowdrops coming up fast and being rather ahead of themselves, making us nervous for our snowdrop days. So what March will bring is anyone's guess!

Daffodil season will probably start early, so why not consider a group visit for March? Easton Lodge Gardens don't open on Thursdays until April, so a group visit is the only way to see the daffodils in the Lime Wood at their best.

Last year we welcomed the retired International Daffodil Registrar to the gardens. She found many daffodils that resembled the 17 old varieties that she identified in her 2003 survey. They were probably planted at the time that Peto redesigned the gardens for the Countess of Warwick. The main catalogue available then supplied more than 400 varieties. Now Kew reckons that 36 wild varieties have been identified and there are over 26,000 cultivated varieties. So, open your eyes to daffodils this year! If you want to arrange a





Felsted Plan review and survey

Background and current position

The Felsted Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is currently undergoing a review to ensure it is completely up to date so that we can maintain the best opportunity to protect ourselves from unwanted development. Following previous Focus articles a number of local people volunteered to support our NP review; a Felsted Neighbourhood Plan Review Group (FNPRG) was formed and has been working on the review.

You cannot fail to notice a lot of development going on around us at present but the majority is outside the parish. There is some development underway within Felsted but this is either supported by the existing Neighbourhood Plan (and brings with it significant community infrastructure benefits) or the application was approved before our existing NP was fully 'made' in February 2020.

Neighbourhood Plans are all about planning. We know there is resistance to any future development but we must be realistic and accept that, as has been notified in various previous publications, Felsted has been allocated around 95 new homes in the current draft Uttlesford District Plan.

However, those 95 homes must be built over a 17 year period (between now and 2041) which averages less than 6 dwellings per year, significantly fewer than the number of dwellings we had imposed on us over recent years and prior to the existence of our current NP.

There are strong relationships and interactions between the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), a Local Development Authority (LDA) 'Local Plan' - in our case this is Uttlesford District Council (UDC) - and any fully 'made' NP.

The NPPF provides the framework for all development and includes very strict requirements that must be met if 'unwanted development' is to be successfully challenged.

Unfortunately, UDC does not currently meet many of those NPPF requirements. Their current plan is considered to be out of date (dated 2005) and whilst they are working on a new plan, that's not expected to be effective until mid-2025. In addition, UDC cannot demonstrate the necessary 5 Year Housing Land Supply (YHLS) and the Housing Delivery Test (HDT) is below the required 75%. None of this is good news!

Felsted Plan review and survey

There is within the NPPF, what is known as 'a presumption of sustainable development' which is often applied where a LDA is unable to meet the NPPF requirements. Where a developer claims an application to build meets this 'presumption of sustainable development' and the LDA is not able to meet the NPPF requirements, it can be extremely difficult to challenge an unwanted application.

However, there is a critical policy in the NPPF that says that where a community has an 'up to date' NP (that is, one fully 'made' within the last five years) and that plan supported housing towards the LDA's 5 YHLS, the NP is given elevated weight in planning terms. It means a development is, under normal circumstances, deemed unacceptable where it can be demonstrated that it conflicts with policies in that NP. in other words, it does not qualify as sustainable development.

As the Felsted NP was fully 'made' in February 2020 and supported 63 dwellings (which also delivers our new Health Centre and a car park for our Primary School), not only are we able to challenge unwanted development but more importantly many developers do not bring forward development in Felsted parish because they know that where there is a NP that is less than 5 years old there is little chance that it will be approved. The same applies to planning appeals. If a refused application is taken to appeal, the likelihood is that it will be dismissed.

Of the 60 parishes within Uttlesford, Felsted is one of just eight with an up-to-date NP. That's why Felsted is extremely successful in challenging unwanted development and deterring developers from submitting applications.

With any NP is it important to communicate with the community in order to share aspirations, seek input and gain the support of residents.

Therefore, we are planning two community events in March to tell you what's happening and to get your opinions. One event will be in the early evening on Friday 15 March and the other on the morning of Saturday 16 March. Both will be held at the Memorial Hall and further details will be included on the Felsted Parish Council website.

Felsted Plan review and survey

Housing needs survey

It is critically important that any Neighbourhood Plan takes account of local housing needs. This enables the review group to consider the type of housing that is required or preferred by the community. You will know that most developers want to build large 'executive' type of homes but this is not necessarily what the community actually wants or needs.

A housing needs survey will be circulated to every household in Felsted and it is your opportunity to voice your opinion and particularly to advise of any current or future housing need within your own household. This could be low cost housing for a younger person, a couple or family or for a smaller home suitable for downsizing.

The survey will be carried out and the responses analysed by the Rural Community Council of Essex (RCCE). They are an independent charity that helps communities throughout rural Essex and have a great deal of experience in administering housing needs surveys for local authorities.

All personal details will remain strictly confidential to the RCCE and will not be shared with the review group or Felsted Parish Council.

The purpose of these questionnaires is to help establish if there is any need for alternative or affordable housing within the parish which the revised NP can help, potentially, to deliver. Again, the responses are confidential and only aggregated results will be included in the final report to the NP team.

Please be sure to complete the survey even if you have no immediate housing need.

The Hundred Parishes

We are fortunate today that we have a benefit system to help vulnerable people. In the past, the less fortunate relied on parish relief or the generosity of the better-off. Some wealthy benefactors left money for the provision of almshouses. You can see an article on almshouses on the Hundred Parishes website at www.hundredparishes.org.uk.

Other philanthropists helped the poor by giving money in a variety of ways. Some churches record the benevolence of these donors on large 'benefactor' boards. For example, in St. Peters, Ugley we are told on one board that Robert Bucke, a draper, in his will of 1620 gave 3 suits of clothes to 3 poor men and 3 suits to 3 poor women with hats, to be given every third year 'for ever'.

Just a few miles away in Manuden's parish church, a board describes three benefactors, one of whom is the same Robert Bucke. Here he gives the same number of suits to the poor of Manuden, with additional hats, shoes and stockings.

In Little Hadham the church of St. Cecilia has a board recording that Miss Ann Scott, in her 1865 will, left dividends to the rector and church wardens to distribute bread on Shrove Sunday each year 'at their discretion' to the poor of the Parish.

Hatfield Broad Oak's Church of St. Mary the Virgin has a brass plague describing the generosity of John Gobert. He left £600 in his will of 1623 for the purchase of land, the proceeds from which were to be distributed in a variety of ways including £4 per annum to the town of Hatfield Broad Oak. His heir Sir John Barrington subsequently bought the manor of Keeres in Aythorpe Roothing to comply with the will.

Please look out for more proclamations of generosity.





DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' CORNER

Refuse Collections

I would like to apologise to our residents over the performance of the UDC refuse service in the past weeks - there was an unacceptable failure. Many will have read the UDC advices as to the reason. It was because of a failure in the UDC office to take steps in time to renew its HGV Operators' Licence, causing the UDC refuse fleet to be temporarily 'grounded'. There were no deficiencies in the vehicles themselves nor of the drivers or loaders.

The licence required renewal in January after the previous Transport Manager left UDC's employment and his successor was awaiting his accreditation. This lapse should never have occurred and understandably, many residents have criticised the service failure. Of course, a detailed enquiry as to the human and administrative errors is underway. Several residents have asked if they are to receive a rebate on their Council Tax to represent the cost to them of the missed/delayed collections. The answer is no – the actual cost per household is about 50p per bin collection/day missed and to reprogramme the invoicing system to make an adjustment for this modest sum would be disproportionate.

Some readers may be interested in some background detail about the refuse service. UDC's budget for it is some £12.22m gross pa or £5.85m net pa, after recovery of fees etc. The district has been served by nine large and one smaller front line refuse vehicles, together with three spare/standby older vehicles. The vehicles are equipped to receive two grades of material at a time ie either the non-recycling (black lids) or recycling (green lids) in alternate weeks, plus food caddy contents every week.

Improvement in the service is required and the UDC budget for 2024/2025 provides for the purchase of three additional refuse vehicles (each costs about £285,000) as well as the recruitment of additional loaders and driving personnel. There will then be an increase in the number of rounds and improved coverage which is needed after Essex County Council closed the waste transfer station in Great Dunmow, where vehicles previously emptied their loads. Currently, vehicles have to travel to Braintree refuse centre to dump, adding an extra 90 minutes per round/day, resulting in slower completion. Further, the 15% population growth experienced in the district over the past decade also has caused greater volumes for processing.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' CORNER

Our district recycling performance is interesting and compared with the other 11 local authorities in Essex, we perform very well regarding our 'green' bin effective recycling rate where we come top of the district at 29%. Our black bin recycling rate is much lower, where we stand in ninth position at 20%; the 'top' authority recorded a rate by comparison of 33%. Food waste collected via the brown caddies shows the district performance being ranked in the middle of the peer group at 8.9%.

Essex county Council is currently publicising a campaign to encourage us all to recycle more effectively. The aim is to reuse, recycle, or compost 70% of all waste produced by residents in the county by 2030. The latest statistics reveal that for England, the rate is 44.4%, while in Wales it is 56.7%. However, already, some 37,000 tonnes of food waste was converted last year via anaerobic digestion into energy (supplying power to the equivalent of 6,310 homes' usage) as well as also providing high quality crop fertiliser. This bio-conversion results in a reduction of in excess of 32,000 tonnes of CO2 emissions pa.

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
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


